The Community Committee was requested to give its support to the charity.

Members were keen to support the charity and requested that leaflets be emailed to them so that they could ensure they were left in public buildings. It was agreed that the Children's Services & Family Health Sub Group should lead on this and the matter was referred to the Sub Group for consideration.

The Director of Environment and Housing submitted a report which updated the Committee on the latest information with regards to lettings policy review consultation. In February 2016, Executive Board agreed to commence consultation on these proposed changes to Housing Leeds' current lettings framework with a view to approving a revised policy in September/October 2016.

The consultation commenced with two Elected Member sessions in early March 2016. This has been followed by further consultation with local tenant and resident groups, statutory and voluntary sector partners and individual tenants and residents.

The paper provided an update on progress with the consultation to date, and some feedback on the key themes to emerge so far.

The report set out the proposals being consulted on to the council's lettings, including the development of a tenant transfer list, a review of the lettings policy and a new approach to community lettings policies.

The report set out the proposed consultation process and timescales for implementation of the new policies.

Members discussed how the policy would be applied to people living on the boundaries of different wards and also how it would affect people in other parts of the City wishing to re-locate to a ward in the Outer North West.

Members noted the issues faced in the Outer North West area such as the high house prices and supported the local connection preference detailed within the submitted report.

Members raised the issue of similar aged people living in similar blocks which it was considered generally reduced problematic issues faced by residents. However it was noted there were examples of younger people who preferred to live within proximity to older people.

The Committee were broadly supportive of the proposals set out at paragraphs 15 to 18 of the submitted report. However, Members felt it necessary to hold a workshop with all members of the Outer North West Committee to be invited, with the relevant council officers, to establish exactly what a local connection was and clarify the issues surrounding ward boundaries.

**Leeds Transport Conversation** 

### **Purpose of report**

 To report on the Transport Conversation and engagement process and seek feedback and input from Members on the future strategic approach to transport in the city and the development of a proposition and delivery plan for the £173.5 million fund due to be allocated following the cancellation of the NGT project.

### Main issues

- 2. Transport is a fundamental component of what makes a prosperous and liveable city. Our vision is for Leeds to be a compassionate, caring city with a transport system that helps all our residents benefit from the city's economic growth. Getting our transport system right is a critical element of achieving the Council's Best City ambition.
- 3. Following the NGT Public Inquiry in 2014, the Department of Transport (DfT) announced (12<sup>th</sup> May 2016) that the Transport and Works Act Order (TWAO) powers for the New Generation Transport (NGT), would not be granted. However, at the same time the Secretary of State committed to making available to the city the £173.5m funding previously allocated to the NGT scheme, would be available for alternative public transport improvements in Leeds.
- 4. A letter was received from the DfT (23.06.16) confirming funding for public transport improvements stating that

"The £173.5 million has been retained for Leeds because of the well-rehearsed and long standing need for significant public transport improvements in the city, particularly in the absence of a rapid transit system along the lines previously envisaged. This does not have to be a like for like alternative to the NGT scheme, a programme of smaller coordinated interventions may deliver change in a more realistic and publicly acceptable way."

5. In response to the NGT decision, the Leader of the Council initiated a city wide debate on the future transport strategy which was launched with a Transport Summit (10th June 2016). The Summit was attended by over 170 stakeholders from across the city who contributed to a discussion on the city's transport ambitions. At the Summit, the Leader announced the start of the City's largest ever Transport conversation seeking views from key stakeholders, partners and most importantly, communities from across the city. Councilor Blake said;

"A city as diverse and geographically large as Leeds has many different needs, so we are encouraging as many people as possible to let us know their stories and put forward their ideas."

- 6. The first phase of the "Transport conversation" was launched by an on-line survey on the 2<sup>ND</sup> August www.leeds.gov.uk/TransportConversationSurvey and will close on the 20<sup>th</sup> September. Paper copies will be made available at Hubs, One stop centres and Branch Libraries along with being sent directly to access group members without online access. The online survey has been circulated to a wide range of networks across the city and includes the following communication activities and events.
- 7. These Channels include the distribution of 10,000 Postcards, advertising the questionnaire at events such as City Connect, South Bank Consultation. With Posters, postcards and paper copies available at the Community Hubs and One stops Branch Libraries Housing offices and arts centres. There is to be a wide range of marketing employed including advertising on the radio, on bus rears and sides, advertising at various rail sites, social media and press releases.
- 8. Following on from the Transport Summit workshop, there will be two further workshops arranged for the 15<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> September 2016, with additional workshops and presentations with key stakeholders, as well as one to ones with Operators, Business, Special interest User Groups, Access and equality groups. The Transport Conversation is also working alongside the West Yorkshire Combined Authority (WYCA) and partners along with the setting up of an Independent Panel of experts to help inform the programme.
- 9. These activities and feedback will inform the development of a wider set of strategic principles on which further conversations with the city will continue before finalising the long-term strategy at Executive Board sometime next year (Spring/Summer 2017).
- 10. Additionally the Transport Conversation feedback will be fed into the development of an outline series of proposals for spend of the £173.5m, culminating in a report to Executive Board currently planned for the 19<sup>th</sup> October 2016 meeting. The rational for an early submission is to gain the certainty and commitment needed to allow the development and progression of detailed planning and proposals by securing early government sign-off for the £173.5m earmarked for Leeds. Subject to approval by Executive Board, it is anticipated that a formal case will be submitted before the end of autumn 2016. And so a first phase of consultation along with an early Executive Board report is required in the context of the development of a longer term strategy.

- 11. Alongside this conversation the West Yorkshire Combined Authority (WYCA) are currently undertaking consultation on a new West Yorkshire Transport Strategy and Bus Strategy which includes a series of 23 drop in events across Leeds. The feedback received will be used by WYCA to develop a new, 20-year West Yorkshire Bus and Transport strategies. A team from the Combined Authority, along with representatives from bus operators, will be on hand at each event to answer questions and help people take part. Officers from the Council's Highways and Transportation service will be supporting WYCA colleagues at the events.
- 12. This work will complement and develop the work set out in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Leeds Transport Strategy Executive Board Report.

### **Options**

- 13. An Executive Board report in October 2015 set out how Leeds provides a strong historical illustration of how major investment in transport infrastructure has resulted in transformational economic growth from the Leeds Liverpool Canal, to the Victorians who cemented the city's position on the railway network, to our emergence as a 'motorway city' in the 1970's. Today, Leeds is following the global trend towards highly skilled jobs clustering in a compact environment. If this growth is to continue, people need to be able to easily access a denser and more productive city centre.
- 14. With additional car demand come additional issues to resolve, for example road causalities, poor air quality, noise, carbon, congestion. Our centres can be car dominated in places whereas we want public spaces which are more people friendly. To tackle these issues and grow our city sustainably, we need more people travelling by sustainable modes.
- 15. The ambition is to have a transport system that supports the growth of our economy, creates a place people want to live and work, that everyone can access, that has a positive effect on people's health and wellbeing and is less harmful on the environment.
- 16. The Council with the West Yorkshire Combined Authority (WYCA) and partners are already delivering significant improvements to transport in Leeds to help deliver these ambitions. The Elland Road park and ride, delivered in partnership with WYCA, is already proving very popular, and given the demand the car park is now being extended. A further Park and Ride will open at Temple Green in the Aire Valley Enterprise Zone early next year with construction starting in September. As a Council we have pressed for greater local control of rail services as is now reflected in the Rail North and the new Northern and Trans Pennine franchises which will provide for greater growth and new trains. The southern entrance to Leeds Station opened earlier this year supports our ambition to double the size of the City Centre by regenerating the Southbank. The new station at Kirkstall Forge has opened providing a new park and rail option, and unlock the development of new homes and jobs. These are just a few of the examples of the schemes already in construction. With significant funding from the West Yorkshire Transport Fund, the Council is also developing a number of new schemes, including the East Leeds Orbital Road, the Leeds Bradford Airport link (LBA)Road and a transformation of the way traffic uses our City Centre.
- 17. With the promise of the additional £173.5m, the Council can now develop plans for further improving transport in Leeds. This plan will be pragmatic, deliverable, and focus on the outcomes the Council is

trying to achieve. In deciding how to best spend the allocation, the Council will need to make decisions between investing in schemes that can be delivered in the short and medium term, such as park and ride sites, high quality fast bus routes, new rail stations, better public spaces and cycle and walking routes. And plans for long-term projects, which would enable us to provide more capacity to cater for the growing number of trips.

18. The Council recognizes that decisions on priorities will be needed given our limited road space and our constrained rail network. Successfully balancing the conflicting and complex demands on our land use and road space across different stakeholder groups will be a major challenge for the city. The Council intends to develop the plans in collaboration with the City so that these decisions can be owned, understood and supported as it is only with strong support that successful schemes will be delivered.

### **Corporate considerations**

### a. Equality and diversity / cohesion and integration

Improving public transport, will improve local connectivity and in turn increases access to employment, education, and leisure services and facilities for all equality groups. The Transport Conversation will be attending a number of different equality group meetings and directly engaging with these groups. Any specific impacts on equality characteristics will be examined in individual schemes.

### b. Council policies and city priorities

The anticipated benefits for Leeds from the Transport Strategy development and conversation have the potential to contribute to the vision for Leeds 2030 to be the best city in the UK. Including the following Best Council objectives; promoting sustainable and inclusive economic growth, supporting communities and tackling poverty, building a child friendly city and contribute to the Councils cross cutting 'World-class events and a vibrant city center that all can benefit from' Breakthrough Project.' The vision also contributes to the objectives of the Local Development Framework, Leeds Core Strategy, and Local Transport Plan 3, emerging WYCA Transport and Bus strategies and Strategic Economic Plan.

### Conclusion

- 19. The cancellation of NGT has opened up the opportunity for the City to discuss the future strategic transport provision for the City both in the shorter and longer term. The first phase is of necessity, needing to be concluded by October to help ensure confirmation of the £173 million funding promised by the Government. However the conversation will continue to develop into a longer term consultation into the Spring/Summer of next year.
- 20. A presentation at the meeting will summarise some of the key themes along with the wider regional context and some emerging options for the transport programme as the basis for dialogue and feedback from Community Committee members and further input from the local community.
- 21. Members are encouraged to support the Transport Conversation in the local communities and to let officers know of community networks who may be interested in engaging in the Conversation

Finance Update Report For Decision

### **Purpose of report**

1. This report provides the Community Committee with an update on the budget position for 2016/17, detailing the current position of the Wellbeing revenue fund, the Small Grants and Skips pots, and the Capital pot. This report also provides an update on the Youth Activity Fund.

### Main Issues

- 2. Community Committees have a delegated responsibility for the allocation of area Wellbeing funding. The amount of Wellbeing funding provided to each committee is calculated using a formula agreed by Council taking into consideration both population and deprivation of an area.
- 3. The Outer North West Community Committee operates a pre-sift process for Wellbeing fund applications. This involves discussions with appropriate ward members for that particular project, in the context of the current area priorities; where projects do not have support from all three ward members they are not progressed. All applicants are offered further discussions and feedback if helpful. In order to provide further assurance and transparency to all applicants where schemes do not garner support these will be reported to a subsequent Community Committee meeting for noting.

### 4. Budget Statement 2016/17

The latest Budget Statement for 2016/17 is included at Appendix 1 to this report. The statement details the overall budget position of all Wellbeing and Youth Activity Fund projects funded in the current financial year as well as those funded in previous years which still have funding left to spend.

### 5. Wellbeing 2016/17

Members are advised of the new revenue wellbeing allocation for the Outer North West Community Committee of £114,360 for the financial year 2016/17. The Community Committee have previously agreed that this allocation is split equally by the 4 wards (£28,590 per ward)

- 6. After deducting any existing commitments and taking account of the 2015/16 carry forward position, the Community Committee has £135,716 of funding available for allocation. This figure does not include the Youth Activity Fund still available to spend.
- 7. Table 1 below includes details per ward of the total revenue available for allocation in 2016/17 including any carry forward from previous years, and the amount of Wellbeing currently available to spend per ward.

- 8. In 2013/14 Guiseley Neighbourhood Watch was awarded £3,000 Wellbeing funding to set up cold calling zones in the area, in September 2015 Members agreed to reduce the grant to £1,500. This project has now completed with an underspend of £897 which has been returned to the Guiseley & Rawdon pot and is reflected in table 1 above.
- 9. In 2013/14 Horsforth Farmers Market was awarded £3,200 with the agreement that £2,500 would be repaid by the end of the 2016/17 financial year; this has now been repaid in full and is reflected in table 1 above.

14. The costs for Horsforth CCTV 2016/17 have not been recommended for approval at this time.

### Youth Activity Funding

- 15. The budget for the Outer North West Youth Activity Fund for 2016/17 is £52,706 which includes the new allocation of £50,670 and underspend of £2,076 from 2015/16.
- 16. At the Community Committee on 18<sup>th</sup> May, projects totalling £46,112 were approved. The remaining balance of Youth Activity Fund is £7,981.
- 17. In 2015/16 the Community Committee approved £1,012 for a cooking programme run by Mighty Chefs, delivery of the project was reduced and has completed with an underspend of £419 which has been returned to the pot for reallocation.
- 18. In 2015/16 £1,305 was approved for ESNW Cluster to run summer football and Lego activity sessions. The Cluster delivered the Lego sessions but were unable to deliver the football sessions; the project has therefore completed with an underspend of £705 which has been returned to the pot for reallocation.

### Wellbeing Budget – Small Grants & Skips

- 19. Table 2 below details the small grants approved since the start of the new financial year. Table 3 below details the remaining small grant balances; there is £15,907 still available for allocation for small grants.
- 20. A small grant application was received from Adel Crag Community Association applying for £565 towards a variety of items for the tenants and residents. The application was not approved.

**Community Committee Update Report** 

### **Purpose of report**

- This report updates the Community Committee on the work of the sub groups of the Committee: Environment & Community Safety; Employment, Learning and the Local Economy; Children's Services and Family Health; Adult Social Care, Health & Wellbeing; Highways & Transportation and Policy.
- 2. The report also updates the Community Committee on community forums and partnership working that has taken place in the area since the last meeting.
- 3. Members are asked to note the area update newsletter.

### Main issues

- 4. The Outer North West Community Committee has a range of sub groups which set priorities, agree topics for consideration at Community Committee and develop action plans to address issues of thematic importance. The committee currently operates six sub groups: Environment & Community Safety; Employment, Learning and the Local Economy; Children's Services and Family Health; Adult Social Care, Health & Wellbeing; Highways & Transportation and Policy.
- 5. Sub group meetings are informal meetings and not open to the public, however local residents or representatives of other organisations may be invited to attend and speak at the discretion of the chair of each sub group.
- 6. Where possible the Community Committee Champion has been aligned with the relevant sub group chair and in consultation with the theme leads have provided the following updates:

### 7. Environment & Community Safety

### 8. Community Safety

The sub group met on the 30<sup>th</sup> June and received an update from the local Neighbourhood Policing Team (NPT). Members were advised that whilst figures for assault showed an increase at the last sub group meeting in April, this was due to changes in recording methods and in real terms there has been no increase in assaults across Outer North West. There has been an increase in burglary dwelling and theft from motor vehicles, however these remain comparatively low compared to other areas in North West Leeds. The NPT has undertaken some proactive work with the Crime Reduction Officer to tackle this issue.

**Community Speed Watch** - two ward managers have been trained to use Speed Indicator Device (SIDs) and currently 10 volunteers have been recruited from across the area. Training for volunteers is currently being undertaken and it is hoped the scheme will become operational over the summer.

**Anti-Social-Behaviour** - following complaints regarding anti-social-behaviour at some local retail parks and leisure centres, a number of services have worked in partnership to develop a programme of interventions to tackle concerns raised. This has resulted in a reduction of calls to the Anti-social-behaviour Team.

**Winter Warm Pack Initiative** – the police are currently working with the fire service to identify vulnerable/older people and to help them keep safe and warm. The sub group received information on what is included in a winter warm pack and agreed in principle to a joint well-being application from the Police and Fire Service to support the initiative.

### 9. Environment

The Environment sub group met on 20th July 2016. It was agreed that the priorities for 2016/17 would remain until the new Service Level Agreement is drafted and approved.

The Locality Team updated the sub group on requests for service since March 2016. There have been 1,826 requests for service in that period; 14 legal notices have been issued, 5 fixed penalty notices and 1 prosecution has been submitted. Members agreed a range of initiatives regarding dog fouling and have requested further costs.

Highways gave an update on grit bins and priority gritting routes and it was agreed that the key locations in each ward would be presented and discussed at the September meeting. Gullies were also discussed and it was agreed to invite an officer from the Gully team to the next meeting.

The Parks & Countryside Officer gave an update on ongoing work and particularly noted that the work carried out for the 'In Bloom Groups' this year has been very well received.

### 10. Health and Well-being and Adult Social Care

Members whose wards fall within the Leeds West CCG have been invited to an update on New Models of Care with NHS Leeds West CCG. This will be at the Conservatory, St George's Centre, Great George Street, Leeds, LS1 3DL. It will be on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> of October, 12.30 to 2.30pm.

**Smoking cessation support** in the outer north west area is available at Wharfedale General Hospital, Guiseley & Yeadon Surgery and New Croft Surgery, Horsforth.

**Care View** - continues to be developed and its users are steadily increasing. It has been listed by the Observer newspaper, along with other LCC Innovation/Urban labs, as being in the top 50 innovative social / urban technology projects in the UK. This was developed through the Outer North West Health and Wellbeing Sub Group.

**Financial Inclusion work** - continues with Money Buddies Winter Friends scheme which now extends over the summer months. A Money Buddy can go into a local residents home accompanied by a worker from a local Neighbourhood Network and offer money maximisation and energy saving help without the resident having to leave the comfort of their own home.

### NHS Campaigns to promote in ONW Leeds

### GP appointment. Don't need it? Cancel it!

We know people forget things, cancelling GP appointments being one of them. It's easy to forget things from birthdays, your keys or even people's names. We recently did some research to find out why people did not attend (DNA) their GP appointments and the biggest reason for this was that people had simply forgotten about it. In fact almost 4 in 10 people had forgotten to do this. You can help us and other patients. If you cancel a GP appointment you no longer need it means someone else can have it.

### NHS Health Check

If you're aged between 40 and 74, you may be eligible for a free NHS Health Check that can help you live a longer and healthier life. All GP practices within ONW Leeds are now offering the NHS Health Check to eligible people who are registered with the practice. Speak to your local GP to find out more about an NHS Health Check. The NHS Health Check programme aims to help prevent heart disease, stroke, diabetes and kidney disease. Everyone between the ages of 40 and 74, who has not already been diagnosed with one of these conditions, will be invited (once every five years) to have a check to assess their risk of heart disease, stroke, kidney disease and diabetes and will be given support and advice to help them reduce or manage that risk.




# New App tackles Social Isolation

Outer North West Community Committee's Health and Wellbeing sub group has developed a new way of finding people who may be socially isolated, and at the same time helped Leeds City Council's Innovation/ Urban Lab to be named as one of 2016's New Radicals by the Observer newspaper.

Care View is a downloadable and free phone app designed to help people register their concern about people in their community, simply by pressing a button. The app suggests a range of triggers such as post piling up or overgrown gardens and this information generates a heat map which can be followed up by an appropriate service.

The service can then knock on the door or arrange to deliver some leaflets on the street to see if a socially isolated resident needs help or support from health care professionals.



# **Early Success for Care View**

The app has enjoyed some heart-warming early successes. One trial user of the app was walking home down a cul-de-sac where cars rarely travel and spotted a house showing some of the signs of social isolation suggested by Care View. As the person knew one of the neighbours she asked her about the neglected property.

Later on the neighbour knocked on the door of the property and introduced herself to her neighbour. It was immediately clear that the lady was struggling, during a friendly conversation she told her neighbour that she needed help to move and sort her belongings but had arthritis and wasn't sure what to do. The new neighbour kindly contacted social services and assistance was sent round to help clear the house under the resident's instructions.

From a conversation and a door knock help was delivered to an older community member.

At the new Hub you can use the library, use the internet, ask about Council Services, register a birth, get money advice, visit the jobshop, get advice from Leeds Credit Union, hire the community space, join the readers group and loads more activities!

Yeadon Carnival was a huge success this year with hundreds of people enjoying a Roald Dahl themed day; Councillors gave £500 towards the event.


Guiseley Carnival Parade was another fantastic day with Councillors awarding £700 to support the road closures for the parade.

### **Guiseley Library turns 60!**


