40 Open Forum

In accordance with the Community Committee Procedure Rules, the Chair allowed a period of up to 10 minutes for members of the public to make representations or ask questions on matters within the terms of reference of the Community Committee. On this occasion no members of the public present wished to make any representations.

Overview on the Development of the Leeds Plan and West Yorkshire and Harrogate Sustainability and Transformation Plan (STP)

The report of the Interim Lead for Leeds Health and Care Plan provided the Community Committee with an overview of the emerging Leeds Plan and the West Yorkshire and Harrogate Sustainability Transformation Plans (STP).

Councillor Wakefield introduced the item. Members were informed that the Community Committee was the forum to keep local Councillors and Health Partners engaged. There were significant challenges and changes ahead and there was a need for more engagement with CCG's, voluntary services and other health partners to be able to carry out priorities at a local level.

Paul Bollom, Interim Lead for Leeds Health and Care Plan; Dr Sarah Harding, Park Edge Practice and Simon Neville, Leeds Teaching Hospitals Trust gave the Community Committee a presentation. The following was highlighted:

- The plan had been produced through wide consultation and the Health and Wellbeing Board and informed the long term ambition to improve healthcare in Leeds.
- The need for broader engagement with local people.
- The Leeds Plan and how it will inform the STP.
- How to tackle the following gaps:
 - Health and Wellbeing
 - Care and Quality
 - Finance and Efficiency
- Health statistics for Outer East Leeds.
- Preparing for the future new housing and changing demographics.
- Members were asked what priorities could reduce the Health and Wellbeing Gap, how to carry out meaningful engagement with citizens and how the Community Committee could carry on being part of the conversation.

In response to Members comments and questions, the following was discussed:

- Concern regarding the lack of public consultation for the West Yorkshire Plan to date.
- Engaging communities via Elected Members and Community
 Committees making use of those who have a good understanding of
 what goes on in communities.
- Knowledge of what health gaps and demands there are.
- The need to place an emphasis on prevention investing in prevention to save money in the long term.
- Targeting resources to improve the life expectancy gap.
- How to deliver services closer to where people live.
- How to engage and work with the voluntary sector.
- Engagement with Mental Health services.
- The need for more cohesive discussions between health partners and developers regarding future infrastructure.

RESOLVED -

- (1) That the key areas of focus for the Leeds Plan as described in the report and how they will contribute to the delivery of the Leeds Health and Wellbeing Strategy be noted.

Community Committee Appointments 2017/2018

Purpose of report

- 1 The purpose of this report is to note the appointment of Councillor Harland as Chair of the Community Committee for 2017/18 as agreed at the recent Annual Council Meeting, and also to invite the Committee to make appointments to the following, as appropriate:-
 - Those Outside Bodies as detailed at section 19 / Appendix 1 of this report;
 - One representative to the Corporate Parenting Board;
 - Community Committee Champions, as listed; and
 - Those Children's Services Cluster Partnerships, also as listed.

Main issues

- 1. Noting Appointment of Community Committee Chair for 2017/18
- 2. Members are invited to note the appointment of Councillor Harland as Chair of the Community Committee for 2017/18, as agreed at the recent Annual Meeting of Council.
- 3. Appointments to Outside Bodies
- 4. Member Management Committee annually determines which Outside Bodies will be delegated to Community Committees for appointment. Attached at Appendix 1 are those organisations.

5. Appointments to Community Committee 'Champions'

6. The Constitution requires that Community Committees appoint Member 'Champions' in several designated areas. Currently, these areas are: 'Environment & Community Safety'; 'Children's Services'; 'Employment, Skills & Welfare'; and 'Health, Wellbeing & Adult Social Care'.

7. Appointments to Children's Services Cluster Partnerships

8. Previously, Member Management Committee has resolved that the nomination of Elected Member representatives to the local Children's Services Cluster Partnerships be designated as a 'Community & Local Engagement' appointment, and therefore be delegated to Community Committees for determination.

9. Appointment to Corporate Parenting Board

10. In recent years Community Committees have been used as the appropriate principle body by which local Elected Member representatives are appointed to the Corporate Parenting Board.

Options

9. Outside Bodies

- 10. The Community Committee is invited to determine the appointments to those Outside Bodies as detailed within section 19 / Appendix 1. The Council's Appointments to Outside Bodies Procedure Rules can be made available to Members upon request, however, a summary of the rules can be found at sections 11-16:
- 11. The Community Committee should first consider whether it is appropriate for an appointment to be of a specific office holder¹ either by reference to the constitution of the outside body concerned (if available), or in the light of any other circumstances as determined by the Community Committee. Such appointments would then be offered on this basis.
- 12. Nominations will then be sought for the remaining places, having regard to trying to secure an overall allocation of places which reflects the proportion of Members from each Political Group on the Community Committee as a whole.
- 13. All appointments are subject to annual change unless otherwise stated within the constitution of the external organisation, which will therefore be reflected on the table at Appendix 1. Each appointment (including in-year replacements) runs for the municipal year, ending at the next Annual Council Meeting.
- 14. Elected Members will fill all available appointments but it is recognised that Political Groups may not wish to take up vacancies which are made available to them. In such circumstances, vacancies will be notified to the Community Committee and agreement sought as to whether the vacancy will be filled.

¹ For example it may be considered necessary or otherwise appropriate to appoint a specific Ward Member

- 15. A vacancy occurring during the municipal year will normally be referred to the Community Committee for an appointment to be made, having regard to the principles described above.
- 16. Community Committees may review the list of organisations to which they are asked to make appointments at any time and make recommendations to Member Management Committee.
- 17. Please note, any appointments to those Outside Bodies detailed in Appendix 1 / section 19 which are made by the Committee at today's meeting are subject to Member Management Committee approving at its first meeting of the municipal year, that arrangements for such appointments remain unchanged and that they continue to be made by this Community Committee.

18. Outside Body Appointments 2017/2018

19. This year there are **5** appointments which are due for review/determination relation to the following organisations:-

HOPE (Halton Moor & Osmondthorpe Project for Elders) – 2 Appointments

Cross Gates & District Good Neighbours Scheme

Neighbourhood Elders' Team

Swarcliffe Good Nighbours Scheme

Local Housing Advisory Panels

20. As was the case in 2016/17, a dedicated report regarding Elected Member representation on the Local Housing Advisory Panels can be found elsewhere on the agenda.

21. Community Committee 'Champions'

- 22. The Community Committee Champions role aims to provide a local "lead" perspective and further facilitate local democratic accountability; particularly in conjunction with the relevant Executive Member. It is formally defined as covering the following areas:
 - To provide local leadership and champion the agenda at the Community Committee.
 - To represent the Community Committee at relevant meetings, forums and local partnerships.
 - To build links with key services and partners.
 - To provide a link between the Community Committee and the Executive Member to ensure local needs are represented, issues are highlighted, best practice is shared and to facilitate local solutions to any issues.
 - To maintain an overview of local performance.
 - To consult with the Community Committee and represent local views as part of the development and review of policy.

- 23. As set out in the Constitution, the Community Committee is invited to appoint to the following Community Lead Member roles, in respect of:
 - Environment & Community Safety (currently Cllr M Harland)
 - Children's Services (currently Cllr H Hayden)
 - Employment, Skills and Welfare (currently Cllr P Grahame)
 - Health, Wellbeing and Adult Social Care (currently Cllr K Wakefield)
- 24. Given that these roles may need to be tailored to best reflect specific local needs and circumstances, Community Committees may wish to consider splitting two of the roles namely:
 - Environment & Community Safety with one Member focusing on the environment agenda and another on community safety.
 - Health, Wellbeing and Adult Social Care with one Member covering the public health and wellbeing agenda and another focusing upon adult social care.

25. Corporate Parenting Board

- 26. Under the Children's Act 1989, all local Councillors are corporate parents, this means they have responsibilities relating to the quality of services for those children who have been taken into care by the local authority (children looked after).
- 27. Executive Board has previously agreed a clearer framework for the corporate parenting role in Leeds. This included establishing a core group of councillors with a special interest in leading the work on Corporate Parenting the 'Corporate Parenting Board'. This core group includes representation from each of the 10 Community Committees and takes particular responsibilities relating to influencing, performance monitoring, and governance of those issues and outcomes that affect looked after children.
- 28. In February 2015, Executive Board approved a report that proposed a number of developments to enhance the Corporate Parenting Board, including a better link to the 'Care Promise' for looked after children and more regular involvement from senior leaders and partners both within and outside of the Council. The Board considers information including fostering services, residential care, looked after children's educational attainment and their voice and influence across the city. Representatives are asked to link back to local looked after children's issues through their Community Committee and champion the importance of effectively supporting those children. This is an important role within the overall framework of support and accountability for looked after children's services. The March 2015 Ofsted report for Leeds highlighted the positive benefits and impact of the Board's work.
- 29. The Community Committee is asked to appoint one representative to the Corporate Parenting Board for the duration of the 2017/18 municipal year. The Committee may consider it appropriate to combine the role with that of the Committee's Children's Services 'Champion'.
- 30. It should be noted that membership of the Corporate Parenting Board is encouraged for any Elected Members with a particular interest in the outcomes of looked after children, therefore whilst each Community Committee is asked to appoint one Member (to ensure an even geographic spread), it is possible for additional Members to participate.

Therefore, additional Members with a particular interest are advised to approach the Chair of the Corporate Parenting Board, or make the relevant officers aware.

31. Children's Services Cluster Partnerships

32. Clusters are local partnerships that include, amongst others: the Children's Social Work Service, schools, governors, Police, Leeds City Council youth service, Youth Offending Service, Children's Centres, Housing services, third sector, health, local elected members and a senior representative from children's services. Local clusters are key to the Children & Families Trust Board partnership and delivery arrangements.

33. They aim to:

- enable local settings and services to work together effectively to improve outcomes for children, young people and their families;
- build capacity to improve the delivery of preventative and targeted services to meet local needs;
- create the conditions for integrated partnership working at locality level;
- promote the Children & Young People's Plan and the ambition of a child friendly city across the locality.
- 34. A "well-coordinated locality and cluster approach results in early identification and extensive work with families according to need." (Ofsted report, March 2015).
- 35. Clusters began life as extended services for schools and have grown to engage a wide range of partners who provide early help and early intervention and prevention. In April 2011, the Children & Families Trust Board and Schools Forum agreed the adoption of a minimum standard for the terms of reference across the cluster partnerships, which included elected members as standing members of the governance group for each partnership.
- 36. Elected Members also sit alongside a senior leader (Local Authority Partner) from the Children's Services directorate to be part of the Council's representation on each cluster partnership.
- 37. In June 2013 Member Management Committee delegated the nomination of Elected Member representatives to local Children's Services Cluster partnerships to Community Committees. This was with the aim of establishing a clear formal link between those Committees and Clusters. It was also with the intention of building closer working arrangements to better support the needs children and families across the city.
- 38. The Committee is invited to nominate Members to each cluster partnership within their area for the 2017/18 municipal year. The table below sets out the suggested numbers, Ward links and current representation as a basis for discussion:

Corporate considerations

a. Consultation and engagement

As such, these roles would also look to address any equality, diversity, cohesion or integration issues arising in their specific areas.

Also, Council representation on Outside Bodies and Children's Services Cluster Partnerships will enable those appointed Members to act as a conduit in terms of promoting the Council's policies and priorities. As such, this would potentially include matters relating to equality, diversity, cohesion or integration.

c. Council policies and city priorities

Council representation on, and engagement with those Outside Bodies, partnerships and organisations to which the Community Committee has authority to appoint, is in line with the Council's Policies and City Priorities.

d. Legal implications, access to information and call in

In line with the Council's Executive and Decision Making Procedure Rules, the power to Call In decisions does not extend to those decisions taken by Community Committees.

e. Risk management

In not appointing to those Outside Bodies or Cluster Partnerships listed within the report, there is a risk that the Council's designated representation on such organisations would not be fulfilled.

Conclusion

39. The Community Committee is asked to consider and determine the appointments to those designated Outside Bodies, partnerships and organisations as detailed within the report and appendix.

Recommendations

- 40. The Community Committee is asked to consider and confirm appointments to the following:-

OUTER EAST COMMUNITY COMMITTEE - UPDATE REPORT

Purpose of report

1. To bring to Members' attention an update report on work based on priorities identified by the Community Committee that are not covered elsewhere on this agenda. It also provides opportunities for further questions or to request a more detailed report on a particular issue.

Main issues

Updates by theme: Children and Families - Cllr Helen Hayden

2. The last meeting of the Outer East Children and Families Sub Group was held on Monday 13 February 2017 and the most recent was scheduled to be held on Thursday 1 June. A verbal report will be provided for Members at today's meeting.

Housing

- 2.1 2017/18 Outer South East Housing Advisory Panel Funding is £43k.
- 2.2 Halton Moor Kicks football programme with Leeds United FC foundation continues to attract a regular attendance of 25+ young people from Halton Moor and Osmondthorpe. The free sessions are held every Friday between 5.30pm & 7.30pm. The funding was also for 5 young people to achieve the young ambassadors programme, but coaches were particularly impressed with 8 young people from the area so agreed to allow all 8 to participate. The project also received £5k Safer Communities funding and a visit by the West Yorkshire Crime Commissioner Mark Burns-Williamson is to take place on Friday 16 June.

- Halton Moor Kicks is a flagship scheme and discussions are now underway to replicate this in other parts of the city.
- 2.3 At its June meeting the housing panel is to consider priorities for 2017/18 and update its 'plan on a page' taking into account recent STAR findings and satisfaction results. The panel will also discuss and consider a potential cap on schemes presented.

Updates by theme: Employment, Skills and Welfare - Cllr Pauleen Grahame

- 3. The Outer East area has 590 people claiming Job Seekers Allowance (JSA) as of March 2017. This is a 28% (230 people) decrease compared to the same period last year. There are 3,070 people claiming Employment Support Allowance (ESA), as of August 2016, which is a 2.54% (80 people) decrease compared to the same period last year.
- 3.1 From April 2016 to March 2017, there have been 955 residents accessing Jobshops, and Employment and Skills programmes, with 215 supported to secure employment and 608 to improve their skills.

The Personal Work Support package (PWSP), requiring unemployed residents in receipt of Council Tax Benefit to attend Jobshops for additional job search support, is working well. Since it commenced in April 2015, 1,799 have attended and 429 (24%) have secured employment. There are currently 51 residents engaging or have completed this programme in the Outer East..

Thorpe Park

3.2 At Thorpe Park the developer is the Scarborough Group and the main contractor GMI Construction started on site April 2015.

The mixed use development is ongoing, comprising:

- offices (business park)
- retail and bar / restaurant
- hotel
- leisure facilities
- multi-storey car park
- 300 new homes
- other infrastructure works including roads, car parking.

Key activities: (estimated dates)

- Manston Lane Relief Road start on site July 2017 (prep works)
- New bridge start of works June 2017
- Housing development start on site Spring 2018
- Construction of new A2 building Autumn 2017

Retail/leisure - start on site April 2017 with the units open late 2018.

To date, 52 people have accessed jobs created as a result of the Thorpe Park development with 4 from the local target wards, 15 from other Leeds postcodes and 33 non Leeds. Scarborough Group and its contractors and sub-contractors have engaged with over 1,300 young people at the following schools – Temple Moor, John Smeaton Academy, David Young Academy, Leeds East Academy, Leeds City Academy, Roundhay High School, the Co-operative Academy and Parklands Primary school

Victoria Gate

3.3 The Victoria Gate Casino in the city centre was part of Victoria Gate, a key development for Leeds. The casino recruited 250 people in jobs, 80% (201) were from Leeds and 21 residents from the Outer East secured employment. There were a number of initiatives to support the recruitment to these new jobs, an assessment centre aimed at NEET young people took place in October; a Pre-Employment Training event was held in December; and information sessions across the city.

Updates by theme: Health, Wellbeing and Adult Social Care – Cllr Keith Wakefield

- 4. On 26 January, the South and East Health & Wellbeing Forum which covers all the Outer East wards was held at The John Charles Centre. It focussed on the topic of mental health and wellbeing. Attendees had the opportunity to share their views and ideas to develop new mental health work streams in area covered by the Leeds South and East Clinical Commissioning Group. (CCG.)
 - Discussions centred on what is being done well and what could be done better to address mental health priorities in this area. Notes from table discussions are being used to shape new work, linking to the Leeds South and East (LSE) CCG Health Inequalities Fund, which aims to address local priorities in relation to mental health & wellbeing
- 4.1 Based on an extended primary care model, LSE CCG is supporting a "Live Well Leeds" team for people with multiple long term conditions. The model will provide better outcomes for patients, increase satisfaction and reduce costs.
 - It enables primary care, community care, mental health and adult social care to work closely with specialists from hospitals and third sector organisations to provide a single extended primary care team.
 - LSE is working collaboratively with Church View, Manston and Ashfield in the Cross Gates area to provide a Live Well team for patients in Cross Gates. There has been a positive response on improving overall health through medicine

reviews, outpatient or diagnostic referrals, improved mobility and help to navigate the healthcare system and financial issues.

The Live Well Leeds team aims to ensure the care model is holistic and not just medical. An example of how clinicians are working differently is through the development of a Live Well Learning Café, which is being developed in partnership with Orchard Croft. The learning café will be an informal setting for people to come together to learn about managing conditions well. The project will run until March 2018 and will reach 600 people in the Cross Gates area.

- 4.2 Leeds South and East (LSE) CCG Primary Care updates
 - The champion programme helps GP practices encourage patients to complete a bowel cancer screening test. This will continue until 30th September 2017.
 - LSE CCG is procuring a cancer and CVD community awareness programme to increase local uptake of screenings and health checks.
 - Promotion of "Today's The Day" continues through provision of local resources such as banners and flyers. New case studies helping pregnant women to quit smoking have also been developed and are being promoted in children's centres.
 - The LSE CCG Quality Improvement Scheme 2017/18 was launched on April 1st. Level 1 and 2 of the scheme support Public Health prevention work and long term condition management: for example COPD screening rates, identifying patients at risk of diabetes and delivery of the NHS health check.
- 4.3 Leeds Beckett University is evaluating the Connect for Health Service. Initial findings suggest that when local people access the service it has a significant positive affect on overall wellbeing.

South East Debt Forum

- 4.4 Glasspool Charity Trust: Which provides individuals with grants of up to £750 for household essentials - is keen to consult with organisations in debt related areas outside London. Crisis loans for individuals, grants for bankruptcy/debt relief orders, funding for priority debts and debt on pre-payment meters were all stressed as important by forum members. More details are available at www.glasspool.org.uk.
- 4.5 LCC Welfare Rights hosted a meeting of the Advice Consortium with Citizens Advice Leeds, Citizens Advice Chapeltown and Better Leeds Communities. The consortium enables the Council to bring together the funding for advice services across the public sector, provide better value and a consistent level of impartial and free advice. The 3 year contract ended in 2017 and has been extended for one year. Group members made a variety of suggestions for the consortium moving forward.

4.6 A campaign to combat illegal money lending was launched in Middleton Park Ward on 27th March by the SE Debt Forum and elected members. This ward is a hotspot for illegal money lenders so Debt Forum members leafleted 2,300 properties and delivered a specially created postcard promoting the new Stop Loan Sharks website www.stoploansharks.co.uk which makes it easier to report and find help.

Closure of the Outer East Older Persons sub group

- 4.7 There are 32 partners involved in this sub group which has been running for 17 years. Over the last year or so the sub group has seen a steady decline in engagement from partners, most notably the neighbourhood networks on whom the sub group relies for updates by ward. Representation from key personnel has only happened at six of the last 30 opportunities.
- 4.8 It is thought that reduced budgets across the board have resulted in partners focussing on their main duties, which does not give them freedom to engage with the sub-group.
- 4.9 Whilst it is proposed Members should close of this group, Members are advised that the Outer East Community Committee remains committed to helping older people through the various well-being grants that are either running, recently approved, or to which applicants have recently reapplied (to be considered later in the Delegated Budgets Report). Examples include:
 - A £3,000 pot for small sustainable projects targeting older residents whom we have not yet engaged with
 - A £10,000 contribution towards a further year of the Garforth NET social isolation project worker
 - A £10,000 contribution towards a further year of the Garforth NET luncheon club coordinator worker
- 4.10 With support from the Adult Social Care and Health & Well-being Champion, it is proposed that the Outer East Older Person Sub-group be closed, keeping the option to reopen it in the future should an appropriate situation arise.

Updates by theme: Environment and Community Safety – Cllr Mary Harland

- **5.** The Environmental Sub Group met on 2 May 2017. At the meeting the group received updates on OE projects from Highways, Housing, Localities, Parks, Waste Management and Flood Management.
- 5.1 Key discussions included:
 - Cleaner Neighbourhood Team (formerly Localities): Charging for bulky waste collection are now underway. An update has been provided below for the June Community Committee meeting.

- Highways: The transfer of gulley cleaning to Highways is progressing as is the Transport plan following last year's wide reaching consultation. In Outer East several roads are currently being surface-dressed to protect them for the future.
- Flood Management: Undertaking work over the next few months at Barley Hill, Glebelands, Westfield and Killingbeck Meadows. The latter will benefit Dunhills and other areas in Outer East.
- Walkabouts: are being undertaken by the LCC Housing team. The team hopes this year more tenants and officers will join in. The first tranche of Kippax and Methley walkabouts is complete and work is underway to identify priorities in Halton Moor.
- Waste Management's emptying of brown bins has now been limited to a maximum of one per household and work is underway to ensure homes use no more than one brown bin.
- Parks confirmed the entrance to Primrose Valley from Halton is being improved.
- 5.2 The next OE Environmental Sub Group meeting is scheduled for 18.07.2017

Bulky Waste

5.3 In order to book a collection, from 9th May, residents were required to make a £20 contribution towards the cost of providing the service. The actual cost per collection and disposal is far greater.

The change to a chargeable service seems to have gone smoothly. The booking system is working well and there was no spike/backlog to deal with in the first week or two. Customers can now book with no more than a 3 week wait and seem pleased with that.

Although it's early days, it looks like there has been a reduction of around 50% in the number of bulky refuse collection bookings received by the service. This is in line with what we expected and planned for based on the experience of other councils across the country. We have been heavily promoting the use of third sector organisations that offer to collect and re-use items from residents and an element of the income we get will go to support that work.

Customer satisfaction with the service remains very good with only a handful of refunds being required citywide.

The Cleaner Neighbourhoods team will provide statistics to the Committee's Subgroup later in the year.

Leeds Anti-Social Behaviour Team

- 5.4 Joint working with the Police and Housing has been ongoing to identify those known to be involved in anti-social motorcycling. Where nominals are identified an injunction is served by the police or LASBT's Offender Manager. In cases where injunctions are served on council tenants, tenancy warnings have also been issued. The issues around anti-social behaviour involving motorbikes/quads is not a priority at present due to low reporting, however this will be closely monitored in readiness for summer.
- 5.5 Work is underway around Sherburn Square in Whinmoor where a number of youths had been reported causing anti–social behaviour (ASB) and gathering to smoke cannabis. A joint initiative with local policing led to five youths being identified and each youth and their parents were interviewed by the ASB case officer and warned that if problems persist action could be taken against them. The parents were very supportive of the approach and reports have dropped since this intervention. The PCSOs who patrol the area have also reported back that the youths had not been seen hanging about the area since.
- 5.6 In Cross Gates and immediate areas there was a spate of burglaries and the Tasking group requested some of the 2016/17 budget allocation be used for additional patrols to resolve this issue. The police have provided the following update on how this funding led to arrests and helped stop crime.
 - The project started on 11 March with the arrest of a local man wanted for burglary and other offences. He was caught in possession of a knife.
 - Arrest of a local female cycling on Austhorpe Road who was wanted for recall to prison.
 - High visibility patrols addressing nuisance youths / ASB Stanks Lane
 North and Austhorpe Road five stop checks of youths suspected of being involved and intelligence submitted also one arrest for male wanted for breach of bail from a previous domestic related incident.
 - Stop checks of known local youths loitering around ginnels Grafton Villas Leeds 15 intelligence reports submitted by PCSOs.
 - High visibility patrols supporting local elderly resident on Hebden Walk having reported ASB to Cllr Grahame.
 - Stop checks in total around the car park of the Crossgates Shopping Centre near to the pizza shop – a location that has previously experienced youths congregating – again this led to intelligence reports being submitted with youths' names and addresses.
 - Officers patrolled Hebden Walk and conducted an attrition visit on the problem address in order to support an elderly resident on that street.
 - High visibility patrols on the Whinmoor Way area around the Co-op store where youths often hang around –information was obtained.
 - Mill Green area had a problem with youths riding mopeds in an ASB manner – one youth was detained and dealt with by PCSOs – the youth was local to Mill Greens.

PCSOs on an additional patrol in Cross Gates responded to two calls, one
concerned suspected breaking into a car in the Crossgates Shopping
Centre and the other, affecting the same male, concerned breaking into
Paws For Thought pet shop. This resulted in a chase leading to an arrest
for burglary and another for vehicle interference. The suspect was from the
Halton Moor area.

Community Engagement

2017-18 Forums

- 6. Due to reductions in senior staff and the need for attendees to take time off during the day as compensation, Cleaner Neighbourhoods has confirmed it is unable to routinely attend out-of-hours meetings including forums. As an alternative to attending they will provide a written update but if there is a specific controversial issue that needs their input, with a little notice they will endeavour to attend.

Outer East Community Committee Newsletter

The Communities Team produces a newsletter highlighting key aspects of activities after each Community Committee meeting. The team circulates the newsletter to contacts via social media and community hubs such as libraries. The latest newsletter is attached as **Appendix 2**.

Social media

Highlights of the Outer East Community Committee Facebook activity from
 March 2017 - 30 May 2017 is included in **Appendix 3**. It gives details of the top

three most popular posts ('post clicks' to expand the text + 'reactions, comments or shares') during this period.

- 9.1 Two things to note:
 - 'Reach' is the number of people the post was delivered to
 - 'Engagement' is number of reactions, comments or shares. Engagement is a better marker for seeing if people are interested in the posts because they need to interact with it. Eg a post might reach 1,000 people but if they all scroll past and don't read/expand it, the engagement is 0.
- 9.2 Whilst still leading the way, the page has gained a further 90 new page 'likes' in the last 12 weeks and currently has 1,732 followers, which is 220% more than the next most popular Community Committee page.
- 9.3 The Committee is encouraged to Like and Share relevant information from the page and promote the page when possible. The quick search is: @LccOuterEast

Community Centres

A limit has been introduced on the value of discounted lettings which can be approved by each Community Committee in 2017/18. (75% of the value of free lettings approved in 2015/16 in each Community Committee area) All hirers will pay a minimum of 25% of the published community rate.

Arrangements are in place for community centre costs incurred by LCC services and services commissioned by LCC. Internal budget adjustments will be made to account for usage by Youth Services and Neighbourhood Networks which will allow for accommodation costs to be accounted for, but will not add financial pressures to these services.

Local democracy lettings such as councillor or MP surgeries and Community Committee meetings, along with community centre user group meetings, will remain free of charge. Statutory, private and commissioned organisations will not be able to benefit from any reductions.

All community centre users with current free lettings have been contacted and issued with new hire agreements running from 5th June.

There needs to be at least two weeks' notice before the start of any letting to ensure appropriate approvals can be received and hire agreements signed. If hire agreements aren't signed the council's public liability insurance is void.







Community Committee nominations to Housing Advisory Panels (HAP)

Purpose of report

1. To seek Ward Councillor nominations from the Outer East Community Committee to the Outer South East Housing Advisory Panel (HAP)

Main issues

- 2. There are 11 HAPs across the city in geographical alignment with Community Committee's, with the exception of the East Inner Community Committee which is split into two HAPs due to the large number of Council homes.
- 3. Ward Members play an important role in helping the panels undertake their wider tenant engagement role, giving insight into the needs of local communities and linking the priorities of the HAP with the Community Committee so that Council and other services work more effectively together.
- 4. Community Committees in their June 2017 round of nominations are therefore requested to:
 - a. Nominate up to 1 Ward Member per Ward within the HAP area (with the exception of Outer East which has 1 Ward, where 2 nominations from the same Ward are welcomed).

- b. To undertake the above on the basis that all nominations are for full members, with HAP voting rights.
- c. Take into account the number of Council homes in each Ward. For Wards with relatively few Council homes nominations are sought on an optional basis (see **Appendix 1**)
- 5. Council nominations to the panel will continue to help develop local working relationships, especially between the local housing teams, the Tenant Engagement Service and local Communities Teams. Closer working between these teams and services will also help maximise the opportunities for the joint funding of local projects and the identification and support for others to attract external income.

Corporate considerations

6.

a. Consultation and engagement

This report facilitates the necessary consultation and engagement with Community Committee Members in respect of appointments to the designated positions and Outside Bodies. Given that the Community Committee is the relevant appointing body, there is no requirement to undertake a public consultation exercise on such matters

b. Equality and diversity / cohesion and integration

Council representation on Housing Advisory Panels enables those appointed Members to act as a conduit in terms of linking the Council's policies and priorities. It also encourages joint working between services to support local projects; these would potentially include matters relating to equality, diversity, cohesion or integration.

c. Council policies and city priorities

Council representation on, and engagement with Housing Advisory Panels, to which the Community Committee has authority to appoint, is in line with the Council's Policies and City Priorities.

d. Resources and value for money

Council representation on the HAPs encourages closer working relationships, in particular the opportunities for the joint funding of projects that meet local needs.

e. Legal implications, access to information and call in

In line with the Council's Executive and Decision Making Procedure Rules, the power to Call In decisions does not extend to those decisions taken by Community Committees.

f. Risk management

In not appointing to the HAPs, there is a risk that the Council's designated representation would not be fulfilled and the opportunities and benefits to local tenants and residents not maximised.

Conclusion

7. The Housing Service is seeking nominations to Housing Advisory Panels. Community Committees are requested to nominate up to 1 Ward Councillor per Ward within the HAP area. The nominations to the HAPs will continue to help the service build positive working relationships with the Committee and to ensure local priorities are reflected in panel activity.

Recommendations

8. The Outer East Community Committee is requested to nominate up to 1 Ward Member from each of the four wards within the HAP area to serve on the Outer South East HAP.

Background information

- The Environment and Housing Scrutiny Board has requested that more information about the wider Tenant Engagement Framework, and key forums within this (such as VITAL – the Voice of Involved Tenants across Leeds) is shared with Community Committees to raise awareness and help strengthen relationships between services.
- The Tenant Engagement Team is undertaking a review of the Housing Advisory Panels during 2017/18 that will include seeking the views of Ward Members, tenants and others.
- Key functions of Housing Advisory Panels are to:
 - Be aware of the needs of local communities and wider Council priorities and use HAP funds to support a range of community and environmental projects that help support these.
 - Work with local housing and other Council teams to help review and monitor the delivery of local services and help shape services that meet the local community's needs.

Outer East Community Committee Forward Plan 2017-18

Purpose of report

1. This report introduces the Outer East Community Committee Forward Plan for 2017/18. It details the meeting dates and sets out proposed workshop themes. It also highlights the role of the Champions and the work of the Committee in relation to the Council Constitution and associated delegations which are managed through its sub group structure on behalf of the Community Committee. The report also reviews the Committee and its sub structure operations in 2016/17 and makes recommendations for continued improvement.

Background information

- 2. Leeds City Council has agreed a constitution which sets out how the Council operates, how decisions are made and the procedures which are followed to ensure that these are efficient, transparent and accountable to local people. Some of these processes are required by law, while others are a matter for the Council to choose.
- 3. In order to give local citizens a greater say in Council affairs, Community Committees were established to represent all areas of the city. The Constitution states that the Executive can make arrangements for the Community Committees to discharge of some functions for which the Executive is responsible. The Executive has identified a number of functions that Community Committees exercise decision making on, however the Executive remains ultimately responsible for these services and may remove or limit a Committee's powers. As with the Executive, in exercising their powers Community Committees must make decisions which are in line with the Council's overall policies and budget. The Community Committees involves all the Councillors from the wards within each Committee area and meetings are held in public.

Outer East Community Committee structure

- 4. The Outer East Community Committee has put in place a sub structure to provide support, monitoring of performance and, when required, decision making to delegations it is responsible for. These are:
 - Children & Young People's Sub Group
 - Environmental Sub Group
 - Community Committee Champions meetings
 - Temple Newsam Ward Based Briefing
 - Forums (Crossgates, Garforth & Swillington, Halton, Halton Moor & East Osmondthorpe, Kippax & Methley, Swarcliffe, Whinmoor)
- 5. Driving the work of the Community Committee through the sub groups are the Community Committee Champions. The Champions' role aims to provide local leadership for each theme, whilst acting as a critical interface with services. Meeting and working with service leads, Community Committee Champions are well placed to shape the local agenda around each theme. Information on activities by theme is included in the Community Committee Update Report.
- 6. Alongside the Community Committee, 7 forums provide a focussed perspective of local issues. Led by ward members, the forums aim to offer a platform for engagement with local people to:
 - address social exclusion, inequality and disadvantage experienced by people living in the defined boundary;
 - take action to improve residents' quality of life through better and more appropriate public and community led services
 - support the economic regeneration of the area
 - fully involve the community in the development of proposals to improve their area.

Outer East Community Committee workshops 2016/17 (last year)

- 7. Community Committees were established to build on the successes of Area Committees with an enhanced focus on community engagement and in particular, increase the attendance and active involvement of local people at Community Committee meetings.
- 8. The only Ward Based Briefing involving OE Communities is for the Temple Newsam Ward.
- 9. Community Committees continue to work to improve community engagement in local decision making. Themed workshops provide a forum for Councillors, residents and services to consider issues affecting their communities and find solutions. The workshops topics for 2016/17 were determined in collaboration with service leads and Community Committee Champions and Chair.

- 10. The Outer East Community Committee held 4 workshops in 2016/17 covering key issues in the area:
 - Adults & Health Making Leeds the best city to grow old in
 - Highways Public Transport in Outer East Leeds' consultation
 - Community Health Council Your Health & Your Healthcare
 - LASBT / Police Community Safety in Your Neighbourhood
- 11. Actions from each of the workshops have been fed back to services and through relevant sub groups of the Community Committee where key partners are helping to deliver the actions and improve service delivery.
- 12. Attached at Appendix 4 is the draft forward plan for Outer East Community Committee and workshops for 2017/18. Members are asked to consider the forward plan and are welcome to suggest topics for workshops in 2017/18. Proposed topics will then be considered and agreed in collaboration with Community Committee Champions and service leads.

Conclusions

- 13. The new ways of working has enabled engagement with a range of services and stakeholders on a number of topics across the area and provided a platform to make connections with all involved including residents and service users.
- 14. Greater publicity and communication is a key role in promoting the Community Committee and new ways of engagement with residents and local groups has started including banners being placed at various locations within the ward. The Facebook page and Twitter accounts are updated regularly with information about events and meetings. This also provides an opportunity for residents to post comments or questions before the Community Committee.



Outer East Community Committee Delegated Budgets Report

Purpose of report

- 1. This report seeks to provide Members with:
 - a) An update on the outer east budget position
 - b) A review the minimum conditions, as set out in paragraph 8 of this report
 - c) An update on the Wellbeing revenue projects and budget position (Table 1)
 - d) Wellbeing revenue proposals for consideration and approval (paragraphs 18-19)
 - e) An update on Youth Activities Fund projects and budget position (Table 2)
 - f) An update on the Wellbeing capital projects and budget position (Table 3)
 - g) An update on the Wellbeing capital projects approved by DDN since the last meeting (paragraph 27)
 - h) An update on the Small Grants Budget (paragraph 28)
 - i) An update on the details of the Community Skips Budget (paragraph 29)

Background information

- 2. Each Community Committee has been allocated a Wellbeing Budget (revenue and capital) and Youth Activities Fund which it is responsible for administering. The aim of these budgets is to support social, economic and environmental wellbeing of the area and provide a range of activities for children and young people, by using the funding to support projects that contribute towards the delivery of local priorities.
- 3. Delegated budgets cannot be approved retrospectively. An application form must be submitted and approved by the Community Committee before activities are completed or items are purchased.

- 4. Members are reminded that the necessary scrutiny of applications to satisfy our own processes, financial regulations and audit, requires the deadline for receipt of completed application to be at least five weeks prior to any Community Committee. Some applications will be approved via Delegated Decision Notice following consultation with Members outside of the Community Committee cycle.
- 5. Members are reminded that the Wellbeing Fund Large Grant programme supports the social, economic and environmental wellbeing of a Community Committee area by funding projects that contribute towards the delivery of local priorities. A group applying to the Wellbeing fund must fulfil various eligibility criteria including evidencing appropriate management arrangements and finance controls are in place; have relevant policies to comply with legislation and best practice e.g. safeguarding and equal opportunities; and be unable to cover the costs of the project from other funds.
- 6. Members are reminded that projects eligible for funding could be community events; environmental improvements; crime prevention initiatives or opportunities for sport and healthy activities for all ages. In line with the Equality Act 2010 projects funded at public expense should provide services to citizens irrespective of their religion, gender, marital status, race, ethnic origin, age, sexual orientation or disability; the fund cannot be used to support an organisation's regular business running costs; it cannot fund projects promoting political or religious viewpoints to the exclusion of others; projects must represent good value for money and follow Leeds City Council Financial Regulations and the Council's Spending Money Wisely policy; applications should provide, where possible, three quotes for any works planned and demonstrate how the cost of the project is relative to the scale of beneficiaries; the fund cannot support projects which directly result in the business interests of any members of the organisation making a profit.
- 7. Sometimes urgent decisions may need to be made in between formal Community Committee meetings regarding the administration of Wellbeing and Youth Activity budgets, and also regarding the use of the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Neighbourhood Fund which has been allocated to the Committee. Concurrently with the Committee, designated officers have delegated authority from the Director of Communities and Environment to take such decisions.
- 8. The Community Committee has previously approved the following 'minimum conditions' in order to reassure Members that all delegated decisions would be taken within an appropriate governance framework, with appropriate Member consultation and only when such conditions have been satisfied:
 - i. consultation must be undertaken with all committee/relevant ward members prior to a delegated decision being taken;
 - ii. a delegated decision must have support from a majority of the community committee elected members represented on the committee (or in the case of funds delegated by a community committee to individual wards, a majority of the ward councillors), and;
 - iii. details of any decisions taken under such delegated authority will be reported to the next available community committee meeting for members' information.

9. The Committee is invited to review the conditions previously agreed and consider whether any amendments are required, prior to agreeing such conditions for operation in the forthcoming municipal year.

Main issues

Wellbeing Budget Position 2017/18

- 10. The revenue budget approved by Executive Board for 2017/18 is £118,300 which is a reduction of £14,040 from last year.
- 11. Table 1 shows a carry forward figure of £93,936.00 which includes underspends from projects completed in 2016/17 plus £37,687.89 allocated to projects which are not yet completed. The total amount of revenue funding available to the Community Committee for 2017/18 is therefore £174,548.11. Further information of the projects approved or ring-fenced is available on request.
- 12. **Table 1** shows the projects funded by the Community Committee up to and including 25 May 2017.
- 13. It is possible that some of the projects in Table 1 may not use their allocated spend. This could be for several reasons including the projects no longer going ahead, the projects not taking place within the dates specified in the funding agreement or failure to submit monitoring and evaluation reports. Due to this, the final revenue balance may be greater than the amount specified.

14. Christmas lights switch-on events, motifs and trees

At the last Community Committee meeting £25,000 was ring-fenced for 2017/18, based on 2016/17 figures. Given the uneven split shown by the actual spend last year, as shown in Table 1, members are asked to consider a more appropriate method of allocating funds by ward, rather than top-slicing the full amount.

As per Table 1, the £25,000 allocation would breakdown as follows: Cross Gates & Whinmoor £8,500; Garforth & Swillington £9,000; Kippax & Methley £6,600; Temple Newsam £900

15. The Community Committee is asked to note that a total of £76,591.00 has been allocated from the Wellbeing revenue budget so far this financial year and there is a remaining balance of £97,957.11 available to spend for projects in 2017/18, This figure is also broken down to ward level in Table 1.

To part-fund a worker for a second 12 months of the service to make links and engage with the 30% socially isolated older people in the Garforth & Swillington and Kippax & Methley wards. £5,000 from each ward. Funding for this project was ring-fenced at the last Community Committee meeting.

Community Committee Plan Priorities/Objectives:

This proposal supports the **Best City for Health and Wellbeing**: residents in outer east are enabled to participate in local community activities.

19. **Project title**: Luncheon Club Coordinator (12 month extension)

Name of Group or Organisation: Garforth Neighbourhood Elders Team

Total Project Cost: £20,000

Amount Requested from Delegated Budget: £10,000 Wards Covered: Garforth & Swillington; Kippax & Methley

Summary:

To provide a further 12 months of the service to part-fund a worker to coordinate the 13 luncheon clubs across the Garforth & Swillington and Kippax & Methley wards. £5,000 from each ward.

Community Committee Plan Priorities/Objectives:

This proposal supports the **Best City for Health and Wellbeing**: residents in outer east are enabled to participate in local community activities.

20. Funding the projects detailed in (18) and (19) would leave the Garforth & Swillington ward revenue budget with £4,274.60 and the Kippax & Methley ward revenue budget with £6,674.61

Youth Activities Fund position

- 21. The Youth Activities Fund (YAF) approved by Executive Board for 2017/18 is £46,650. Table 2 shows a carry forward figure of £24,636.00 which includes underspends from projects completed in 2016/17 and £3,869.00 allocated to projects but not yet completed. The total amount of YAF available to the Community Committee for 2017/18 is therefore £67,417
- 22. Members are reminded that the budget is split by the number of children and young people per ward and is as follows: Cross Gates & Whinmoor 25.8%; Garforth & Swillington 22.9%; Kippax & Methley 25.7%; Temple Newsam 25.6%
- 23. Applications to Round 1 of the 2017/18 budget totalled over £81,000 and a lot of work was done to bring these fantastic applications back within £11.53 of the allocated budget. Everyone who applied in Round 1 received some funding.
- 24. **Table 2** shows the projects approved by the Community Committee from the 2017/18 budget. The remaining balance of £20,755.47 is a combination of underspends or projects which didn't take place. The £20,755.47 is available for a second funding round, which is open now and will close on Sunday 18 June 2017. Round 2 activities are to take place between 4 September 2017 and 31 March 2018.

Capital Budget

- 25. Community Committees receive a proportion of the capital receipt from Council assets, some of which goes towards Ward Based Initiatives and 5% is top sliced, shared amongst Community Committees and split equally across the four outer east wards.
- 26. Capital injections, as part of the receipts, have been updated every six months. Therefore, including projects allocated and processed by DDN, the Outer East Community Committee has an available capital budget of £48,000.00 over the next 3 years. Approved projects now total £13,900 leaving a remaining balance of £34,100. Members are asked to note the capital allocation broken down by ward as summarised in **Table 3** below:


